Technical requirements

Bilingual approval

Bilingual approval typically allows an early childhood teacher to instruct young children in their native language and English. Erikson's certificate program is designed to enable bilingual, certified early childhood teachers to acquire bilingual approval and continue to work or seek employment in a bilingual early childhood education program. As each state has its own requirements for bilingual approval, you should contact the board of education in the state where you plan to teach for its requirements.

English as a second language (ESL) approval

ESL approval typically prepares monolingual early childhood teachers (i.e., English language speaking only) to effectively instruct new language learners in English. Erikson's certificate program is designed to enable certified early childhood teachers to acquire ESL approval and continue to work or seek employment in an early childhood ESL program. As each state has its own requirements for ESL approval, you should contact the board of education in the state where you plan to teach for its requirements.

Admission

The program is designed specifically for early childhood teachers (Pre-K through 3rd grade) working in public, charter, or private schools and agencies. Current teachers who hold a bachelor's degree and a minimum C+ (2.75) GPA on a 4-point scale are encouraged to apply. Teacher certification is not required for admission, but state boards of education typically only grant bilingual or ESL approval to certified teachers.

Program length and start date

The program can be completed in 16 months. Student cohorts typically start the program in the spring semester, which begins in the first week of January.

Applying

Complete an application for admission online at *www.erikson.edu/applications*. In addition to the online application, you must submit official transcripts of all college and university work, three letters of recommendation, and a short essay. Students will be admitted on the basis of previous academic performance, work history, and suitability for the field.

The priority application deadline is October 15. We will continue to accept applications after the deadline if space is available

Financial aid

Eligible certificate program students may apply for low-interest federal student loans. To be considered for loan assistance, you must complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) available at www.fafsa.ed.gov.
