

## Ebsco Search Tips

1. Access all library databases from the library's website.
  - a. From home page to quickly search 5 most popular Ebsco databases
  - b. From A to Z Databases page to see other databases for more specialized searching
  - c. From Research and Article Databases page
2. From off-campus, you will need to authenticate using your Erikson userID and password, which is the same you use for your Erikson Web Mail. It is NOT the same password as my.erikson or EriksonOnline

<b>Abstract:</b>	In any society, parenting beliefs are a reflection of that society's cultural values and traditions (J. U. Ogbu, 1981). Verbosity, a parenting behavior considered dysfunctional in European American culture, may not be problematic in Chinese culture. The authors recruited 31 Chinese American and 30 European American <i>mothers</i> and used questionnaires to measure parenting behaviors and <i>child</i> behavior problems. The Chinese American <i>mothers</i> also completed a questionnaire assessing their acculturation level. The Chinese American <i>mothers</i> had higher levels of verbosity than did the European American <i>mothers</i> ; however, there were no differences between the groups in <i>child</i> behavior problems. The results also revealed higher levels of laxness in the Chinese American <i>mothers</i> compared to the European American <i>mothers</i> . Acculturation level did not predict verbosity or laxness levels. Results suggest that the effectiveness of a parenting style should be defined relative to cultural context. [ABSTRACT FROM AUTHOR]

### Left to Right:

- Print...the citation & abstract
- Email...the citation to yourself or a friend
- Save... the citation to a text file (**not** save the PDF!)
- Cite....get the APA Citation style (see below for more)
- Export....to a program like EndNote or RefWorks
- Add to Folder....to save this citation for later (may require creating an account with Ebsco)
- Create a Note.... To make a note about this item (may require creating an account with Ebsco)

## Citation Format Screen:

NOTE: the capitalization is off for the article title. Proper APA style does not capitalize every word in the title of articles/book chapters. The title of the article should be in sentence-case, meaning only the first word and proper nouns in the title are capitalized.
