Integrative seminar

The first critical component is a program-long seminar—a real community of practice—that focuses on helping you integrate and apply what you're learning.

In the first year, you'll work with one faculty member, someone who will really get to know you—your strengths, your concerns, your viewpoint. You'll not only have the support and guidance of the instructor, you'll have the input and feedback of your peers. You'll bring issues from your practice into your seminar and look at them with new eyes.

In the final year, you'll have the chance to put it all together though action research. With the support of your seminar leader and peers, you'll choose a focus of interest, something relevant to your development as a practitioner. You'll design a plan of action and collect data, which you will analyze in the community of practice you've been a part of since the beginning of the program. You'll learn to reflect systematically and use your observations to examine and explain how and why things are the way they are.

Both parts of the integrative seminar are designed to give you all the pieces you need—theory, practice, research, and perspective—to advance your skills and practice to the next level.

Core courses

The core, a carefully sequenced set of six child development courses, lays the interdisciplinary foundation that sets Erikson graduates apart, whatever their field of practice. It provides you

with deep knowledge of the child's physical, cognitive, and social-emotional development in the context of his or her family and culture. That knowledge will enrich your experience and improve your practice, whether that's teaching or directing the work of other educators.

Specialized courses

Four early childhood education courses specifically address your role as an educator by focusing on curriculum and assessment and effective teaching in prekindergarten through third grade settings.

M.S. in Early Childhood Education, Bilingual/English as a Second Language specialization

39 credit hours

The specialization in bilingual/English as a second language education helps early childhood educators expand the breadth and depth of their knowledge of the development of young children, and gain a deep understanding of the developmental characteristics and learning needs of children growing up with more than one language.

For prekindergarten through third grade teachers with a valid Illinois early childhood or elementary teaching license, the specialization will also fulfill the Illinois State Board of Education requirements for adding the bilingual and/or ESL endorsement.

To earn your master's in early childhood education with a specialization in bilingual/ English as a second language education, you complete the early childhood education program, substituting five specialization courses for core courses, and also take one additional course.

The specialization includes a culminating action research project that explores the particular developmental characteristics and learning needs of dual language children.

Why Erikson?

In 1966, Erikson was founded on the belief that all children deserve the best chance we can give them to learn and grow. Three simple, radical ideas form the basis of an Erikson education:

- An educator should know the whole child.
 A child is more than his or her body, emotions, intellect, language skills, learning ability, cultural identity, and relationships. A child is all of these things, the interaction of them, and more.
 So Erikson's comprehensive curriculum draws on the fields of psychology, neurobiology, anthropology, sociology, education, and other disciplines to shed light on the complex interplay of influences on each child.
- Children, like adults, learn best in responsive relationships. Erikson faculty engage you in relationships and encourage you to establish and enrich the relationships you have with children and adults in your practice.
- The key to improving practice is professional self-awareness. Through integrative seminars, you will develop the habit of reflecting on your work and on your role as an educator.

All three principles prepare you to work with people who come from backgrounds very different from your own and help you understand how your own culture and beliefs influence your work.

Admission

Our online program is designed for experienced early childhood educators working with children from birth to age 8. Candidates can be educational coordinators, administrators in early childhood programs, educational consultants, early childhood teachers, or elementary teachers in primary grade classrooms.

The admission committee reviews each candidate as a whole. Admission criteria include, but are not limited to, the following:

- A bachelor's degree with a 2.75 minimum grade point average
- A minimum of two years of full-time, post-baccalaureate experience in an early childhood setting
- A demonstrated suitability for working with children and families

Applying for admission

To be considered for admission to the master's in child development program, you must submit the following:

- A completed application form available at www.erikson.edu/apply
- · Applicant self-disclosure form
- Official sealed academic transcripts
- Two short essays
- Three letters of recommendation, including at least one from a current or recent supervisor commenting on the quality of your professional practice
- An interview with a faculty member is an important and required component of the admission process

Financial Aid

Eligible students enrolled in the online program may apply for low-interest federal student loans under two different federal loan programs:

Stafford unsubsidized loans and Graduate

PLUS loans. Erikson Institute participates in the William D. Ford Direct Loan program, which allows federal loans to be disbursed to students without going through a lending institution such as a bank.

We encourage you to begin the financial aid process at the same time that you are submitting your admission application materials.
