Unedited responses to “How would you describe Erikson’s impact on your career?”

- After 40 years, I continue day by day to utilize the combination of knowledge, experience, and deep appreciation of what makes us human in my work. My experience at Erikson was like being planted in rich & fertile soil that supported both my professional personal growth over a lifetime! As I look back over the many stimulating learning experiences I have had throughout my career, it was the training I received at Erikson that most profoundly shaped my professional life
- After I graduated from Erikson Institute in 2008, I have been able to advance my professional career where I work in a more diverse surroundings not only limited to early childhood education, but education in general. In 2008 - 2009, I worked with children with disabilities and provided training for teachers who work with children with disabilities. Afterwards, I worked with the United Nations specialized agency for getting children involved in child labour to go back to school. Now, I am working at the Office of the Vice President of Indonesia, where I work with the Ministry of Education and Religious Affairs to reform the policies and implementation of a National Social Assistance program for the Poor Families and Students. I strongly believe that the experiences I had with Erikson when I was doing my Master degree in Child Development have contributed to the path of careers where I am now - for that I am truly grateful.
- Allowed me to get the necessary credential in early intervention and continued to provide continuing education on timely research and strategies. My emotional connection to Erikson remains strong today even 20 years later. It gave me the license and the confidence to work with infants and young children.
- Almost all of the employers that I had since Erikson were very impressed with the brand name of my graduate degree. It also gave me a stronger grasp on the social, emotional and cognitive growth of the children I was working with, as well as more empathy for the families. I think it also made me encourage more strongly my co-workers and employees to seek further education.

- Although I did not stay in the Early Childhood field per se, I worked with children my entire career and the insights I gained at Erikson prepared me to better understand how kids think, feel, and behave.

Connected me to a community of like-minded peers, such that I feel way less isolated than I did before (used to be I was the only one in a very big agency operating from this framework - this is still largely true, but now I know who the other people out there are!)
- Erikson had a tremendous impact. It moved me out of a medical adult setting to working with children
- Erikson helped me understand child development in the context of a family, school and community environment.
- Erikson affirmed and grew my passion for work with children and families.

- Erikson allowed me to achieve leadership roles.
- Erikson allowed me to experiment with different methodologies and interventions that best suited the clients and their families. I was better able to understand the families and children without judgment but with the awareness that any intervention that as proposed had to be sensitive and practical in application.
- Erikson allowed me to gain new experiences and expand my professional network. I would not have my job if it weren't for Erikson.
- Erikson allows me to teach at a selective university with a MS. Also, through my networking with Erikson alum I have gotten my best jobs.
- Erikson completely changed the way I approach my work as a teacher of young children. My coursework at Erikson taught me to look at the child as a part of a whole - family, community, culture - and to realize how inexplicably linked those parts are.
- Erikson education and rigors gave me the disciplined work ethic, confidence, and expansive understanding of our global world within which young children are expected to develop and grow. Erikson's impact was significant.
- Erikson enhanced my knowledge of children which has been very important in my career as a therapist.
- Erikson facilitated the opportunity for me to establish and secure my philosophies on critical issues in the field of children and families and highlighted how I can positively impact the lives of children and families today and tomorrow.
- Erikson gave me a strong foundation of knowledge to build my career upon and confidence in my knowledge and skills. I feel I have a unique and well-rounded perspective because of Erikson.
- Erikson gave me a unique perspective on Social Work that not many others share. But outside of the Erikson community, others in my field don't know how to recognize or understand that unique perspective.
- Erikson gave me an opportunity to broaden my view of family systems and theory. It offered me a vision of how to continue my work with families. Erikson also gave me personal insight and a sense of credibility.
- Erikson gave me the confidence to advocate for children. I gained the knowledge to back up what I already understood about children while growing in my understanding of children. It also shattered the perceptions I had of parents and what it means to "be family." Erikson fueled my passion for working with young children. My studies organized my brain in a way

that I can engage in conversation and practice with children and families, as well as colleagues and professionals in the field.

- Erikson gave me the confidence to assume greater leadership roles and to be comfortable in both academic and operational roles.
- Erikson gave me the educational base that I needed to be a knowledgeable and informed professional.
- Erikson gave me the foundation, knowledge and confidence to break into the field of early childhood development at the beginning of my career. It has also provided many opportunities for continuing education and learning.
- Erikson gave me the knowledge and tools I needed to impact my work with children, families and teachers.
- Erikson gave me the skills to understand my own cultural identity and the role culture has in how we relate to others. By teaching me stronger reflective listening skills I'm able to be more successful working in a community that is very different culturally than my own.
- Erikson gave me tools to improve my individual skills, increase my credibility and to network with like minded colleagues.
- Erikson gave the intellectual ability to develop my own concept about what is early childhood education. It gave me the knowledge I needed in child development and in implementing a curriculum that meets all the developmental abilities a child needs to become a great college student and a great citizen.
- Erikson had a huge impact on my career. I work with many families where a lot of them I am teaching parenting skills and child development information.
- Erikson had a positive impact at the beginning of my educational career in early childhood. I was able to move up the ladder, pursue other creative and interesting positions, initiatives and projects.
- Erikson had a strong impact on the quality of my work pre vs. post graduate studies. I am a much better teacher for having gone through Erikson's graduate program.
- Erikson has been the foundation of my professional career working with young children and their families. It has given me a framework from which to teach, work with parents and my coworkers as well as assess my interaction with all of them.

It is looked at as the most powerful school in the early childhood field other than National Louis University. Its a big thing if you come from Erikson (at least that's what I think).
- Erikson has had a huge impact on my professional career, I focus my practice on working with children and parents. My training through Erikson gave me the knowledge and skills necessary to do this. Also, Erikson's reputation is recognized in my professional community.
- Erikson has had an incredibly positive impact on my career. I live on the West Coast and while located far away being an Alum has strengthened my credibility and opened many doors. I've been able to work with Dr. Alicia Lieberman who since being a graduate student has been one of my mentors. I am a Brazleton Touchpoints Trainer in Oakland, CA and have had an opportunity to travel to Boston and meet Dr. Brazleton. Erikson has allowed me to diversify my work and to become a deep thinker.
- Erikson has helped me fine tune my understanding, beliefs and values in the importance of early childhood education. Though I had already been in the field, Erikson help me strengthen my knowledge base of child development as well as ignite my passion for social change and equality in urban education.
- Erikson has helped me understand, on a deeper level, the connection between a child's development and learning.

- Erikson has made a great impact on my career. It has helped me secure jobs and prepared me to work with children and families.

- Erikson helped broaden my perspective on child development -- thus allowing me to serve children and families in the church better.
- Erikson helped me to increased my knowledge my knowledge in child development and also helped me to incorporate my knowledge of child development with advocacy and social work.
- Erikson highly influenced my career choice and prepared me in many ways
- Erikson Institute gave me the cultural foundation to work with a diverse population of families, parents, and children. The knowledge I aquired gave me a well-rounded perspepective of not only cognitive and physical development, but a social emotional cultral driven view of diverse populations.
- Erikson Institute had a positive impact on my career.

- Erikson made me look at my work from a different perspective. I probably looked at the "development" of the child previous to my education at Erikson. I now look at the "total package" - child, family, environment, community and even myself to determinehow best to work with the child/family. There is not a day that goes by that I do not reflective on some

aspect of my learning. "What would those at Erikson think of this? is a question I hear in my head all the time!

- Erikson made me more insightful into my work with young children and their families. It also made me more self-aware.
- Erikson not only helped equip me with the child development knowledge needed to be successful in Child Life, but it taught me life skills, such as relationship building, self reflection, taught me how to reserve judgement. Erikson pushed me the and time aain to achieve my potential, thus allowing me to thrive in my professional work.
- Erikson opened up the door for me to actually work as an early childhood social worker (which there are few and far between) with Chicago Public Schools through the Dual Degree Program. It gave me the foundation that partnered with social work prepared meto better serve the children and families I have come across. Even now, having moved on to working with older children in the public school system, I still go back to my foundation in child development. I believe it has made me a more well-rounded social orker and it definitely influences my approach in working with my students.
- Erikson prepared me for the interview process when seeking employment. I felt I had a greater understanding of various concepts (cultural competence, working with families, "it depends", etc.) that have come up multiple times during the course of my emploment.
- Erikson prepared me to successfully meet the many challenges involved in working with diverse children and families in a complex and ever-changing educational environment. It gave me a better understanding of the cultural, political, developmental, and srategical factors involved in various elements of education. At Erikson, I gained strategies for effectively addressing these factors in ways that allow me to partner with families and systems to promote my students' success in the classroom and beyond. Erikson's focus on effective relationship-building is critical.
- Erikson prepared me too look at the overall development of children as I worked closely with them and their families.
- Erikson prepared me well to work in the early childhood preschool classroom. The experiences and classroom lessons changed my teaching and I feel much more confidant in myself as a teacher and colleague.
- Erikson provided a framework for me in a diverse and changeable field. It was a conceptual anchor that gave my career a consistency and constancy

- Erikson provided me with the opportunity to understand the inner life of children and how the field of early childhood can better serve children and their families. Erikson allowed me to have a richer experience as a professional and a sense of community among other students and professors.
- Erikson put me on the trajectory for greatness in the field of early childhood.
- Erikson redefined my idea of what careers I was equipped to seek. And I learned about my own personality, the skills I had, and the skills I needed to sharpen so that I would be able to add new opportunities for work and find satisfaction in that work.
- Erikson refreshed and increased my professional knowledge about working with children and families and gave me the confidence to take on new tasks and goals outside my teaching job (ie. consulting, coaching, etc).
- Erikson staff were mentors and supporters of my continued work in assessment strategies of young children.
- Erikson taught me to think and - perhaps more importantly - ask questions like a clinician. It also connected me to a network of professionals that I am proud to be associated with and have as a resource.
- Erikson took my passion for the field and helped me to build a foundation of knowledge and competencies that I have taken into the field and applied in my daily work and interactions with children, families and co-workers.
- Erikson was a life-changing experience. I truly skated through schooling until Erikson. I loved being challenged and really learning deeply within my field.
- Erikson was a wonderful experience for me. The Program's model (and professors) provided the best education that I had received up to that time. As a result I was fully engaged in the program.
- Erikson was critical to my career and its ongoing advancement.
- Erikson was formative in my career. While I no longer work directly with young children, I am a senior administrator in the highest performing network of charter schools in Washington, DC. My Erikson training directly informs the components of our early childhood program.

- Erikson was invaluable to my career as a preschool and Kindergarten teacher. As a lawyer, the primary benefit has been to serve the community (e.g. as an education committee member of a charter school).
- Erikson was the foundation of my career. I had already completed a degree, but Erikson provided something that no other higher education institution did.
- Erikson was where I finally realized that I really wanted to be a teacher. I had been fighting it a bit thinking about working with children and their families in a different way. However, everything I did and became passionate about seemed to lead me to the classroom. Erikson prepared me to be a teacher and gave me the background in child development that is unique to an Erikson educated teacher.
- Erikson's approach to educating professionals was a good enough fit. I thoroughly appreciate the delicate balance that was held between structure and flexibility.
- Erikson's impact on my career has been incredible. I have such a strong foundation in child development theory, that I am constantly finding myself informing others. I work for an organization that provides inclusive childcare as well as early intervention services. My understanding of the early intervention system and infant/toddler assessments allows me to easily understand and juggle these two aspects of my position. The case studies we did in our seminar class helped to shape the way I conduct reflective supervision meetings with those I supervise. My knowledge of working with people from diverse backgrounds has helped me immensely in my day-to-day interactions with families, the ways in which I support families, and the ways in which I have discussions with those I supervise and those by whom I am supervised. My understanding of and experience with the reflective supervision model has absolutely helped me to be a supportive supervisor.
- Erikson's initial impact on my career was pretty significant. I would not be in the position I'm in today as an Early Childhood Mental Health Consultant--especially my Masters degree is Child Development w/Infant Specialization.
- Erikson's reputation of excellence in the field of child development has made me more reputable to employers. The education and internship experience provided me with a deeper understanding of child development, families, cultural diversity and as well as working with various professionals.

- Eriksson, helped me to feel secure in the knowledge I received. I grew both personally and professionally. I am much better in every aspect of my life, for my time at Erikson.

- I am currently teaching at the college level. It is important to me that the future educators of Early childhood have the passion to work with children as well as the "book" knowledge. What I have learned at Erikson as a

student and alumni, pass along o my students through lecture, articles and personal experience.

- I am very grateful for the child development base Erikson focused on during school. It provided me with a great understanding on the development of a child and how that affects him/her. I also loved the cultural work I did at Erikson, as well as the reflective nature of the courses and internship. It thoroughly prepared me to work with young children.
- I attended college before the Birth to Three/Infant Studies began. I had wanted to pursue my Masters Degree at Erikson, but I was anxious & impatient, at that time, wanting to begin classes right away, but it was in-between timeframes for classes at Erikson. As a result, I enrolled & obtained my first Masters from (then) National College of Education. The thing is, I was still missing the infant part. So, I decided to re-visit Erikson; did; got into the Infant Studies Program; graduated; & I am very happy knowledgeable about Infants & Toddlers. I am also a Developmental Therapist & I teach ECE classes at a college.
- I came to Erikson with a number of years of previous experience in early childhood. I feel that Erikson enhanced and refined a path that I had already chosen for myself.
- I don't know how anyone can run a center without the preparation I received at Erikson!!
- I entered with a master's degree and completed a doctorate after, so Erikson contributed, but is not my sole formal education.
- I feel it is prestigious school with a wonderful reputation however the master's in child development has not provided me the needed credentials and certificates often needed to be considered for other early childhood professional opportunities. I am limited in my options.
- I feel like I gained an entire network of professionals and research that I can access. Its like an extended family.
- I gained a deep understanding of child development through the lens of culture and context. My internship experiences helped me make a transition in my career to the work I am currently doing. Erikson faculty and staff were instrumental in helping me achieve my career goals.
- I gained more confidence in my abilities which I could apply in my workplace.
- I graduated from Erikson almost 18 years ago. At that time I had been working in the EC field for over 10 years. After Erikson it had a huge impact on my career. My Erikson education in tandem with my work

experiences catapulted my career and within three years of graduation my salary increased over \$20,000. And my work and responsibilities allowed me to have a greater impact on the quality and capacity of early childhood education for low income families in Chicago.

- I graduated from Erikson in 1998. In the Chicago area Erikson is very well known and respected. I felt that having graduated from Erikson helped me get my first job and opened up other professional opportunities. To be frank, when speaking to people in the field they were usually impressed when I said I went to Erikson. In 2007, I moved to the East Bay in California. The field of Early Intervention is a bit different out here. Very few people that I come in contact with know about Erikson or what a great program it is. Therefore, I have had to prove myself professionally (which has been good for me in many ways, made me more confident etc.) I am now in a supervisory position - Erikson prepared me with a very solid foundation of child development and working with families, especially working with a variety of families dealing with many different challenges.
- I have a lot of knowledge but still feel I lacked enough professional experience and leadership experience to get where I wanted.
- I have a very well-rounded background of child development that I put into practice every day.
- I have become much more confident in myself and my work. My knowledge of Child Development is excellent and I am able to work with many diverse cultures. Also, I get complimented on my writing skills.
- I have not used it yet as I am staying home for the first few years with my child, but the knowledge I have gained from Erikson is partly the reason I am staying home until my child goes to school.
- I have used my understanding and knowledge about child development that I learned at Erikson daily since I completed my degree. Often I needed it more for adults than children :)
- I learned a lot at Erikson and my time there helped cultivate my interests, but the degree is not marketable. It did not lead to a salary increase and I have had to go back to school to obtain a more useful degree.
- I learned great teaching strategies working with ESL students.
- I learned not only a lot about child development, but even more so about myself. This self-awareness and cultural awareness that I developed has made me a better professional.

- I left Erikson with a renewed passion for working with children and families. I was prepared to work with diverse communities and learned what to expect from supportive supervision.
- I loved going to Erikson and loved the degree. I feel that I have a wealth of information from the degree, but as a dual degree holder, the Erikson degree did nothing to help me get a job (in fact it created an obstacle about being an "over thinker". My salary is the same as if I only had a MSW degree and my job would be the same as if I only had one degree.
- I loved my experience at Erikson! I tell everyone that if you want to learn everything about child development enroll at Erikson. I was so impressed with all the professors and their knowledge in the field! Erikson was a challenge but well worth it. I feel so prepared as a Director working with teen mothers for the past ten years!
- I loved the knowledge and education I received through Erikson. I felt the staff was very supportive and knowledgeable. The opportunity that I received to get an Erikson education wouldn't have happened if I wouldn't have had the grant through the state of Illinois. Thank you.
- I more often say that Erikson impacted my LIFE, not just my career. I definitely left feeling that I had a greater understanding of children and a good knowledge base in child development, but what I learned about myself and others was the greatest gift.
- I purposefully took a step back from my career while I focused on my work at Erikson while also raising my two babies. I had the pleasure of being able to simply be a student for those years and then return to my chosen field (pediatric PT) with new insight from the work I was able to do at Erikson while on my extended maternity leave. My final internship in a UIC's NICU has directly benefitted my pediatric PT work; however, my other internship was not particularly helpful professionally.
- I received my PhD from Erikson in 1991. I secured professorships at the College of Lake County and Northern Illinois University. Because of the emphasis on culture at Erikson, my research and college teaching has contributed meaningfully to the field of cross-cultural psychology and the education of children of immigrant families.
- I studied ESL when I was at Erikson. I was able to get a job as an ESL teacher after graduating. I love my new job!
- I taught public school kindergarten for 20 years in Tampa, Florida. I was able to move into the classroom without further education, based on the supervised teaching experiences I had as a student at Erikson.

- I think the name of Erikson helped me get my job in terms of adding to my credibility. It has had a positive impact on the way I work with families and understand different cultures.
- I understand children better because of EK. I feel knowledgeable and confident with children, families, teachers, and administration. EK helped build this.
- I use the knowledge that I gained every day. It has shaped and continues to shape my career.
- I was hired based largely on my Early Childhood Education credentials which come from Erikson - MS and IL Teaching Certificate. It also helped me realize I wasn't interested in becoming a teacher...yet.
- I was hired because of my degree from Erikson.
- I went to Erikson in 1972 when I was only 23 years old, so it had a huge impact on all aspects of my career as well as personal development. A wonderful grounding in the field, reflective supervision, great teaching models and lifelong friendships.
- I would say that it provided me the education that I needed to advance my knowledge in Child Development that I was looking for.
- I wouldn't be where I am or have been without it.
- I wouldn't have my career if it weren't for Erikson. I presently work at Erikson and Erikson has hand in all of my professional choices and opportunities since graduating.

Only an associates degree is needed for the jobs that are available to me. Yes, I am able to apply my knowledge to my work, but I'm not so sure the benefit was worth the cost.
